








### How the numbers stand for Snapper Survival





Two intakes are being offered this year. Participants can complete the program either online or in-person.



- **Apply now for sea time onboard research vessels**  
Australian researchers are invited to apply for fully-funded grants offering sea time of up to five days on the MRV Ngerin or RV Naturaliste research vessels.  
  
This is a one-off opportunity with options for sea time available in March and April 2023. One grant will be offered per vessel.
- The **Sustainable Seafood Awards Australia** recognise organisations and individuals making a significant contribution to ensure we have fish forever. The annual awards are run by the Marine Stewardship Council in partnership with the Aquaculture Stewardship Council. Applications and nominations are now open.


