The purpose of the **FishRights99** conference is to examine the experiences and implications of the *Use of Property Rights in Fisheries Management* for sustainable fisheries.

The conference will explore national experiences in the development, adoption and implementation of rights-based fisheries management from strategic, political and operational perspectives, including:

- operational issues of allocating fishing rights;
- capacity reduction;
- conservation;
- social and economic issues of concentration;
- royalties and resource rents;
- rights and responsibilities for industry; and
- future applications of rights-based management to high seas fisheries.

**FishRights99** has been designed to encourage participation from all areas of interest and will include three program components:

- 11-12 November 1999  
**Mini-course** on rights-based fisheries management.

- 15-17 November 1999  
**Core** conference offering government, industry and community perspectives on rights-based management.
- 18-19 November 1999  
**Workshop sessions** on specific topics relating to rights-based management.

All those attending the conference should bring to it their experiences, doubts, and suggestions about rights-based management.

## Keynote Profiles



### Dr Lee G Anderson

*Director, Marine Policy Program,  
Graduate College of Marine Studies,  
University of Delaware, Newark,  
Delaware, USA*

Dr Lee Anderson received his Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Washington in 1970. At the University of Delaware he is on the faculty of the Department of Economics and is the Director of the Marine Policy Program within the Graduate College of Marine Studies.

Author and/or editor of five books and many scientific articles on fisheries economics, Dr Anderson has also been a member and the chair of the US Mid-Atlantic Fishery Management Council and an advisor to several of the other seven US fishery management councils and the Great Lakes Fisheries Commission. He has also been an advisor on fisheries management issues to the US National Marine Fisheries Service; the US Department of State; the National Academy of Sciences; the US General Accounting Office; the governments of Australia, Chile, New Zealand, Morocco, and Oman; the FAO and the World Bank. He has also received grants from the US National Science Foundation, the US Sea Grant Program, the National Marine Fisheries Service, the FAO, and USAID. A past member of the Executive Board of the Law of the Sea Institute, he is President-elect of the International Institute of Fisheries Economics and Trade.

In 1993 Dr Anderson received the Rosentiel Award for his Contribution to Ocean Science (USA) for his theoretical and applied work on individual transferable quotas. His current work deals with simulation models, design and implementation of ITQ programs, the economics of fishing in time and space, and marine reserves.



### Dr Ragnar Arnason

*Professor of Fisheries Economics,  
University of Iceland, Reykjavik, Iceland*

Dr Ragnar Arnason has M.Sc. degrees in Economics and in Econometrics from the London School of Economics, and he received his Ph.D. in natural resource economics from the University of British Columbia in 1984.

A Visiting Scholar at the Institute of Fisheries Economics, Norwegian School of Economics in 1987 and a Visiting Associate Professor in the Department of Economics, University of British Columbia during 1989/90, he became a Professor of Fisheries Economics at the University of Iceland in 1989.

Dr Arnason has published extensively and has over 80 international scientific publications in journals and books, primarily on natural resources and fisheries economics. He has also been active as a consultant in the area of fisheries economics and fisheries management in eight countries throughout North America, Latin America, Africa and Asia. He is also a board member of several business enterprises and research institutes and is a member of many government committees.



### Dr Francis Christy

*Senior Research Officer, IMARIBA,  
Washington, DC, USA*

Dr Francis Christy has spent a quarter of a century with Resources for the Future, Inc., a non-profit research group created and funded by The Ford Foundation. He spent the first several years working on the compilation of a long-term series of natural resource data from 1870 to 1957 and producing a book, co-authored with Neal Potter, on trends in natural resource commodities.

In Dr Christy's words, he "fell into the oceans" in the early 1960s when working on his doctoral dissertation on the Maryland oyster industry. Under the tutelage of Dr Anthony Scott, Dr Christy learned about fisheries economics and in cooperation with him produced a book on the Commonwealth in Ocean Fisheries.



In 1980, Dr Christy joined the Fisheries Department of the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations and spent nine years working on fisheries management in developing countries. Since then, he has been a consultant for the World Bank, the Inter-American Bank and the FAO.



## Dr Bonnie McCay

*Professor of Anthropology & Ecology, Department of Human Ecology, Cook College, Rutgers University, New Brunswick, New Jersey, USA*

Dr Bonnie McCay received her Ph.D. from Columbia University in 1976 and teaches in undergraduate and graduate programs. Her specialties include the anthropological and policy dimensions of environmental change and research with coastal communities, fisheries, and management institutions of Newfoundland and Nova Scotia, Canada, and the Eastern Seaboard of the United States.

Dr McCay is the author of *Oyster Wars and the Public Trust* (Univ. Arizona Press, 1998) and co-author of *Community, State and Market on the North Atlantic Rim* (Univ. Toronto Press, 1998), and co-editor of *"The Question of the Commons"* (Univ. Arizona Press, 1987). She is the recipient of several university and professional society awards for fisheries research.

Dr McCay is a member of various scientific advisory bodies, including recent National Research Council committees on individual fishery quotas and sustaining marine fisheries. She is the President of the International Association for the Study of Common Property.



## Dr Anthony Scott

*Emeritus Professor, Department of Economics, University of British Columbia, Vancouver, BC, Canada*

Born in Vancouver, Dr Scott attended the University of British Columbia (UBC), Harvard University and received his Ph.D. in economics from the London School of Economics. While at UBC from 1954 to 1989, Professor Scott held many additional positions including Head of Economics, UBC Senate and other

council positions. He also served as Commissioner on the International Joint Commission, under the US/Canada Boundary Waters Treaty from 1968 to 1973, was a member of a Royal Commission and worked at the OECD and at many renowned universities around the world.

Dr Scott's research has been carried out mainly in two subject areas: economics of federalism and federal finance; and economics of natural resources and the environment. Dr Scott is currently working on natural resource topics, including managing a fishery to get a better price, not a larger quantity. He is also working on a volume on economic history of types of property right for holding minerals, water, fish, etc, and lectures extensively on this subject, especially water rights and fishery rights. Currently, Dr Scott serves as a consulting economist on advisory boards for Statistics Canada and the NorthWest Power Council (USA).

Dr Scott holds various honours, including the Order of Canada, Gerhardsen Memorial Prize (Bergen) and honorary doctorates from Guelph and UBC. He is a member and Innis-Gerin medalist of the Royal Society of Canada.

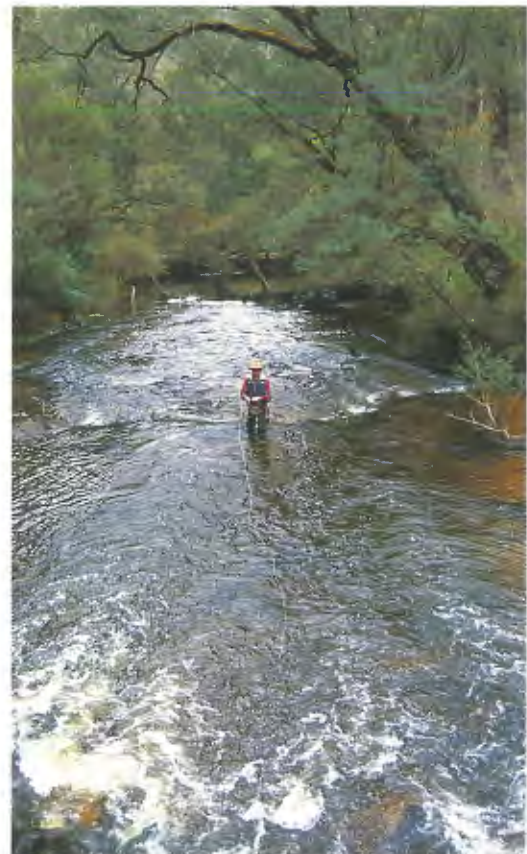

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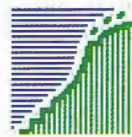
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
