Fishery industry leaders

The Australian Rural Leadership Foundation has, since 1992, developed and delivered leadership programs that make a difference to individuals, organisations and communities that have a commitment to rural, regional or remote Australia. Supporting industry and community leaders helps sustain and build social, economic and environmental values throughout rural Australia.

The Foundation engages participants in authentic experiences and contexts, through either the Foundation's flagship leadership program (ARLP) or its short courses, which help participants develop capability and effectiveness in three key domains:

- 1. personal effectiveness;
- 2. ethics, values, social responsibility, and appreciation of diversity; and
- 3. thinking, including conceptual and analytical.

The Foundation's commitment to ARLP or short course graduates is continued through their membership of the LEAD Network of Fellows. It provides networking and life-long professional and personal development opportunities for all Foundation graduates.

The success of our approach to leadership is evident through the work of our graduates.

This report, focusing on the fishing industry, demonstrates this success by showcasing 45 Foundation graduates and current course participants who all contribute "above and beyond" to rural Australia. This is significant because the first graduate represented in this report, completed the ARLP in 1994, more than 17 years ago.


We are hoping, through updates of this report, to "track" the work of current course participants and provide this information to Fisheries Research & Development.

The members and course participants represented are involved, or have been involved, in the fishing industry in a variety of ways and to various degrees. The vast majority have been funded by the Fisheries Research & Development Corporation although others have been supported by other industry and government organisations.


To classify the areas of interest of the 45 Australian Rural Leadership Foundation fellows and course participants identified in this report is somewhat difficult as the vast majority are involved in the industry at a number of different levels and through various associations, groups and organisations. However, for the purpose of this report the main industry involvement of each participant has been identified.

Of the participants funded by the Fisheries Research & Development Corporation (29.5), only one has moved to another, unrelated industry. Despite this move, the participant remains engaged with rural Australia.

The vast majority of fellows involved in the fisheries industry or related industries have continued in their leadership endeavours post completion of the Australian Rural Leadership Program or TRAILblazers.




Participant sponsor or short course




A characteristic of the leaders described in this report is the propensity to take on additional work within the industry and with other organisations that contribute to industry or community resilience. Due to the plethora of involvement within these additional industry and community organisations, it is difficult to draw an accurate depiction of the number of groups and organisations that individuals have engaged with, although the antecedents provided for each of the Foundation graduates provides a clear indication of high level involvement.

The 45 Foundation graduates and course participants come from jurisdictions throughout Australia, with the highest representation being New South Wales, and the lowest, the Northern Territory.



The majority of leaders (43) represented here completed or are currently participants on the Australian Rural Leadership Foundation's flagship program (ARLP). One graduate completed both the ARLP and TRAIL*blazers*; and two graduates completed TRAIL*blazers* only.

The Foundation's TRAIL*blazers* program is an eight day residential advanced leadership development program for highly experienced leaders. It is designed for leaders who have been

engaged in a range of leadership roles and who have worked in complex contexts for a significant period of time.

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Peter Peterson

ARLP 1 (1993-1994)

Supported by: Rural Industries Research and Development Corporation

Peter is an Assistant Director, Sustainable Fisheries Policy and Assessment, Marine Division, within the federal Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Populations and Communities.

Peter was the Chief Executive Officer of Adult Learning Australia a body whose purpose is to support informal learning in Australia. It t has focuses on literacy, education for interest and the development of basic skills and remedial education.

Peter has been the chief executive for the SA Fishing industry, the national fishing industry and the Australian Pork industry; he also has a strong record of achievement in the Australian Government and also the Queensland Government, where he has worked in primary industries, natural resource management and education. He is currently involved in the assessment of the Southern and Eastern Scalefish and Shark Fishery for sustainability and also involved in addressing fisheries by-catch policy.

Stephen Hinge

ARLP 2 (1995-1996)

Sponsored by: Fisheries Research & Development Corporation



When he applied to participate in Course 2 (1995-1996) of the Australian Rural Leadership Foundation's leadership program, Stephen Hinge was a rock lobster fisherman and wholesaler, and a member of many fishing industry and government industry committees. These included the South Australian Fishing Industry Council, as a committee member from 1990 to 1992; President of the Northern Zone Rock Lobster Association from 1989 to 1992 and a committee member from 1993 to 1994; a member of the Integrated Management Committee for the Northern Zone Rock Lobster Association from 1993 to 1994; and an industry representative for a number of sub-committees.

In undertaking the Program, Stephen hoped to "develop a clearer and more succinct approach to problems and leadership aspects" of his industry and "develop a personal lateral thinking approach to situations and management

problems... and develop a more confident personality in pressure situations".

Stephen's vision for his industry in 1995 was

... to integrate production and marketing with all aspects of resource sharing and environmental considerations.

He wants to

... direct industry on a course of harmony with all other owners and users of our resources and develop a management system that allows maximum utilisation of our country's resources whilst leaving a sustainable resource for all future generations.

By 2000 Stephen hoped to maintain and expand his level of involvement in research and management of rock lobsters and fishing in general and with the support of industry, be a leader of the South Australian Fishing Industry Council and later, the national industry council. By 2005, Stephen stated that he wanted to be an inspiration to South Australian rock lobster research and industry and expand into general fishing and marketing Australia-wide. He also aspired to become involved with regional education and regional economic development.

In 2011, Stephen is a member of the Board of the Australian Fisheries Academy. The Australian Fisheries Academy (AFA) delivers maritime, fishing and seafood industry-specific development and education programs. Courses run by AFA cover all aspects of marine learning, from filleting a fish to skippering a large commercial vessel. AFA also facilitates industry-based traineeships that are specifically focussed on providing opportunities to people wanting a career in commercial fishing, aquaculture, seafood processing, seafood retailing and maritime industries.



Nigel Scullion

ARLP 2 (1995-1996)

Sponsored by: Fisheries Research & Development Corporation

When Nigel accepted his scholarship from the Fisheries Research & Development Corporation to participate in Course 2 of the Australian Rural Leadership Program he owned and managed a small business which operated a fishing vessel and a marine charter service. The company was co-managed by Nigel's wife and employed between five to thirty people at

any given time.

Nigel is the founding Chairman of the Northern Territory Spanish Mackerel Troll Line Association, and had roles as Vice Chairman of the Northern Territory Fishing Industry Council, Delegate to National Fishing Industry Council, Chairman of the Northern Territory Fisheries Training Advisory Board, and Vice Chairman National Fisheries Training Advisory Board.

Nigel was motivated to apply for the Program through a former participant:

I was impressed by his enthusiasm. I also recognised changes in his focus and outlook which I attribute to his participation.

He was further stimulated to apply because of his leadership industry roles:

I presently perform a leadership role as a representative of the Territory fishing industry in a number of state and national fora. These are dynamic times for the fishing industry. At the same time we must adopt better harvesting practices and focus more on international markets. Highly refined leadership skills will be essential if industry is to make these changes successfully.

A vision for the future, according to Nigel, includes long-term ecological sustainability with a fishing industry that is more profitable through maximisation of the value of the catch and the

minimising of costs rather than through catching more and more fish. Building links with Australia's immediate neighbours is also significant for Nigel, with the Asia-Pacific region conceptualised as "neighbours, not as foreigners":

We must build links through trade, technology sharing and cooperative management of shared marine resources.

Leadership characteristics that Nigel would like to see reflected in rural Australia in 2005 include leaders and decision makers who are: inclusive; focus on solving problems rather than creating divisions; not constrained by custom or tradition but analytical and innovative; have the ability to delegate where appropriate; and have respect for and knowledge of the cultures and languages of neighbours.

By 2000, Nigel believed that he would continue as director of both the Northern Territory and the National Fishing Industry Councils. He wished to broaden his activities to include community-based issues, particularly associated with the education and welfare of children. By 2005, Nigel hoped to be elected to the Northern Territory Legislative Assembly as Minister for Primary Industries and Fisheries.

Fast-tracking his plans slightly, Senator Nigel Scullion stood to make his maiden speech in the Senate of Parliament House, Canberra, on Wednesday 13 February, 2002 as a Senator for the Northern Territory. His speech strongly reflects his background as a professional fisherman and his knowledge of the industry is apparent.

After his participation in the Australian Rural leadership Program and before he became a Senator, Nigel was Chair of the Australian Seafood Industry Council until 2005-2006 and he was also Chair of the National Fisheries Training Advisory Board and Chair of the International Coalition of Fisheries Associations.

Nev Perryman



ARLP 3 (1996-1997)

Sponsored by: Fisheries Research & Development Corporation

Neville and his wife Melissa own and operate a diversified fishing business in Tasmania. Although now separated they work as a team in the day to day operation of their business. In the past this gave Neville time to represent the fishing industry at a local and national level.

Neville is passionate about the fishing Industry and its 'fit' with the community. He has held such positions as President of the Tasmanian Fishing Industry Council, and is a former Director of the Australian Seafood Industry Council.

Neville is keenly involved with research and development at many levels, from collecting specimens to sitting on research advisory groups. An example of this was his involvement in the Board selection process for the Fisheries Research and Development Corporation. He completed two years as a Commissioner on the Resource Planning and Development Commission's Inquiry into Marine Parks in the Port Davey and Kent group areas, where he was acknowledged for his ability to work out

compromise positions between industry and other stakeholder groups. Always ready to contribute Neville was invited to Maine to speak about his experiences as a lobster fisher in Australia.

Neville recently stepped down from the Tasmanian Fishing Industry Council Board after 15 years as a Director. He was also a former member of the Tasmanian Fishing Industry Training Board.

Neville was a member of a State Trade mission to China. He has also travelled overseas looking

at other fishing Industries and communities and has hosted visiting overseas fishers and scientists. He is also part of the review into the Seafood Leadership Program, of which he is also a participant.

Membership on the Minister's Crustacean Fishery Advisory Committee still keeps him busy but he is looking for further challenges. Some current work involves men's mental health and support systems for younger people who struggle in our communities.



Neville holds a Master V Skippers certificate, a Marine Engine Driver Certificate and a Certificate in Fisheries Operation and Technology.

Michael Cameron

ARLP 3 (1996-1997)

Sponsored by: TASSAL Limited and Tasmanian Department of Primary Industries and Fisheries

Michael manages Aqua Marine Resourcing (AMR) in partnership with his wife Debbie.

The core focus of AMR is shellfish aquaculture, advisory services, administration and management, manual and electronic stock control systems, business appraisals and training of operational staff from the most basic skill levels to advanced farm management and stock husbandry. AMR also provides a 'hands-on' service, where Michael is available to assist in on farm activities, from the "coal face to the computer".

AMR provides management services for Cameron of Tasmania Pty Ltd. Cameron's operate shellfish hatcheries, nurseries, on-growing, finishing, processing and marketing departments.

Cheryl Phillips

ARLP 4 (1997-1998)

Cheryl is General Manager and Senior Facilitator for Leading Industries, an organisation that encourages participants to reach their potential by developing their skills, confidence, knowledge, networks and big picture perspective. Specifically for the seafood industry, Leading Industries runs the National Advance in Seafood Leadership Development Program to equip participants to effectively represent their industry at a state and national level. It is a six month program which

includes three residential skill sessions of three, two and three days respectively. A second program entitled State Impact on Seafood Leadership Training Program equips participants with the skills, knowledge and confidence to participate at an individual, enterprise and industry level.

Cheryl holds a Masters Degree in Social Science and recently completed her Doctorate. Cheryl is a former local government councillor and the recipient of the APEN (Australasia Pacific Extension Network) Award for Excellence in Extension 2001.

Duncan Leadbitter

ARLP 4 (1997-1998)

Sponsored by: Fisheries Research & Development Corporation

Duncan established his own consultancy, Fish Matter Pty Ltd (www.fishmatter.com.au) in 2009. Through his company, Duncan does a lot of work for a United States-based non-government organisation called Sustainable Fisheries Partnerships which works with businesses and fisheries to implement sustainability commitment.



Duncan is also involved with contract work for the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, the International Finance Corporation, The Commonwealth Fisheries Association, Industry and Investment NSW, Taronga Zoo, Poseidon Aquatic Consulting and the World Wildlife Fund. He is also a Visiting Fellow at the Australian National Centre for Ocean Resources and Security at the University of Wollongong.

Duncan was with the Marine Stewardship Council (MSC) from 2000 to 2009 as International Fisheries Director with responsibility for managing the MSC's Asia Pacific region. In this role he encouraged fisheries, the post-harvest sector, and consumers to become involved in the program and he worked with fisheries that were already at various stages of the certification process. Prior to, and during his time with the MSC, Duncan gained extensive experience in fisheries in Europe, Asia, North America and the Pacific.

Before joining the MSC, Duncan was the Executive Director of Ocean Watch Australia, a not-for-profit organisation that aims to protect and improve fish habitats and reduce the impacts of fishing. He has also worked within state government for the fisheries agency in New South Wales as a habitat/conservation manager and in the private sector as an environmental consultant.

For example, Duncan was the Deputy Director of the Australian Seafood Industry Council and held a number of positions on federal and state-based natural resource and biodiversity advisory councils. He chaired the national Squid Management Advisory Committee for the Australian Fisheries Management Authority.

With a background in the management of aquatic habitat and fishing impacts, Duncan has worked on marine protected areas, aquaculture assessments, habitat rehabilitation, pollution assessments, environmental education and bycatch management. He has also worked collaboratively with a variety of fishery stakeholders including industry, environment groups and government.

He has written a number of published works on fisheries, coastal zone and habitat matters. He holds a Science Degree (Hons) from the University of Sydney and a Masters Degree in Environmental Planning from Macquarie University.

Sally Tonkins

ARLP 4 (1997-1998)

Since 1998 and following completion of Course 4 with the Australian Rural Leadership Program, Sally and Graeme Tonkin sold their oyster farm and moved from the town of Cowell and have entered new careers beyond aquaculture.

Sally completed a post graduate certificate in Business Administration, an Advanced Diploma in Residential Care and an Associate Degree in Social Science (Residential Care). These formal qualifications provided her with the skills required to run a boarding house. Initially sally worked with Annesley College; a boarding house for 80 secondary girls but now works with Immanuel College's co-educational boarding school in Adelaide.

Prior to this, Sally was an oyster farmer and Director of Oyster Traders Pty Ltd. She was a member of the South Australian Fishing and Seafood Industry Training Council Curriculum Advisory Group for degrees, diplomas and certificates in aquaculture, and the Eyre Regional Development Board Fishing and Aquaculture Target Team.

Dr Nick Austin is Chief Executive Officer of the Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research. He took up the position in July 2009. As CEO, Nick is responsible for developing and implementing ACIAR's strategic and operational plans, and for managing the Centre's operational functions. One of the research programs run by ACIAR is "Fisheries".

The goal of the Fisheries program is to improve the productivity and sustainability of fisheries and aquatic farming systems in partner countries

and in Australia through international research partnerships directed at: innovative resource management approaches; the elimination of serious adverse environmental impacts arising from fishing or farming practices; better utilisation of existing harvests; and the development of productive and sustainable aquatic farming systems.

Prior to his position at ACIAR, Nick was Deputy Director-General with the New South Wales Department of Primary Industries where he led the department's Agriculture, Biosecurity and Mine Safety Division.

Previously he headed the department's Science and Research Division and in this role had oversight of fisheries research.

Dr Austin has also held senior positions in the Victorian public sector and he has participated in high-level inter-jurisdictional committees and worked collaboratively with a number of peak industry bodies.

Dr Austin is a hydrologist by training and has a broad background in agricultural and natural resource research and policy. Educated at the University of Melbourne and University of Sydney, Nick holds a Doctor of Philosophy, a Master of Sustainable Management and a Bachelor of Engineering (Agriculture) degree with Honours.

Stephen Tapsall

Stephen works with Santos looking after water related matters with their Gunnedah CSG exploration and appraisal.

Prior to this appointment, he co-ordinated water resource strategies for Brisbane City Council including their WaterSmart Strategy.

Stephen's career includes work for Australian and Queensland governments, industry peak bodies and the CSIRO specialising in natural

resource management, community engagement and primary industries. His work has led to

developing codes of practice for fishing, sugar and north Australian beef industries which enabled him to live and work extensively across northern Australia.

When working with the fishing industry, Stephen worked for what was then called the Queensland Commercial Fisherman's Organisation under Ted Loveday (ARLP graduate, Course 8), and prior to that he worked alongside Marty Breen , a graduate from Course 10. During that time Stephen was also a member of the National Environment Committee with former ARLP graduate, Duncan Leadbitter and met several other ARLP graduates from the fishing industry.

His sugar industry code of practice was developed when working for the Queensland government, working alongside Bob Rossi (ARLP graduate) from Innisfail and the code was to improve fisheries habitats through good farm practices. This was eventually adopted by industry, supported by fisheries scientists, endorsed by Government and linked to legislation.

FRDC also contributed to some of Stephen's CSIRO work in the Kimberley as part of larger research consortium.

Stephen has several degrees in environmental science and an Executive Masters in Business Administration.

At the time of completion of the Australian Rural Leadership Program, Martin was Chief Executive Officer of the Australian Prawn Farmers Association.
