FRDC's Extension Officer Network: Unseen hands creating big differences


FRDC's Extension Officer Network (EON) continue to be the quiet achievers of fishing and aquaculture, bridging the gap between FRDC's research and real-world impact.

Smartphone option to add critical recreational catch data



FRDC 2022-23 investment for innovation and impact

FRDC's accomplishments in 2022-23 have set new benchmarks in research, development, and innovation, with a remarkable investment of \$38.96 million in Australia's fishing and aquaculture sectors, as highlighted in our recently release annual report.

- Australia's [National Marine Science Committee \(NMSC\)](#) is seeking an [Independent Chair](#) to lead the next phase of its growth as the government finalises and implements its Sustainable Ocean Plan, and marine sectors continue their focus on improved sustainability and pursuing net zero solutions.
- Southern Rock Lobster Limited (SRL) is seeking to appoint a new [volunteer Independent Scientific Board Member](#).
- Affectus and FRDC [want to hear about your understanding](#) with the learning and training preferences of the people working within the seafood sector, to help design future learning and leadership programs.
- FRDC, Charles Darwin University, Northern Territory Seafood Council, and Women in Seafood Australasia have partnered to help investigate ways to grow and retain women working in the Northern Territory's commercial seafood sector, where worldwide they are significantly underrepresented. - Australian hospitality venues will soon be required to tell customers where their seafood was caught after the [federal government announced](#) country-of-origin labelling would be made mandatory for the fishing and aquaculture sectors.
- Central Queensland University are offering [three 1000-dollar scholarships](#) to assist with expenses related to participation in the upcoming AgEd24 3rd Symposium.
- [Entries are now open](#) for the Royal Queensland Aquaculture Awards 2024.




